
Vacation Bible School and Summer Study






My favorite new book is Becca Stevens' The Way of Tea and Justice: Rescuing the World's Favorite Beverage from its Violent History Ms. Stevens' mission isn't so much about stewardship of the Earth as it is about caring for God's battered and troubled women but she does this in a way that encourages us to use our resources justly, without poisons, conserving water, and appreciating the bounty of what we can cleanly grow ourselves. I recently wrote about her book **HERE**. Through the birth and growth of Thistle Farms in Tennessee the author has brought many women away from being trafficked, back from the brink of death to the center of life where they have a new purpose. The women use organic plants grown on the farm to make clean healthy products they sell worldwide allowing them to escape addiction in a new community of acceptance and love.

In 1971 a young man wanted to work in Appalachia to save the mountains from strip-mining. David Douglas was what we would now describe as "spiritual – not religious." Though not a Christian he dubiously accepted a job with The **Mountain Project** as a youth leader for three churches. His goal was to help mountain people. He did this but he was not prepared for the way the mountain people cared for him. David Douglas became a minister and more than thirty years later he gives credit for his gradual conversion to his year of working along the Coal River. His experience working with Appalachian folks in food pantries, clothing stores for the poor, in protesting strip-mining and pollution of streams taught him who God is. In his book, <u>Letters of Faith</u> Douglas uses the letters, A to Z to answer the question Jesus asked Peter, "Who do *you* say that I am?" His



simply-written witness to life in the mountains can teach us much about listening to and learning from the people we feel called to serve.



Patricia K. Tull is a Professor Emerita at Louisville Presbyterian Seminary and the author of several books including curriculum for PC(USA). Her book, <u>Inhabiting Eden:</u> <u>Christians, The Bible, and The Ecological Crisis</u>, has been overlooked in the Resource Center. For a year it has sat on the shelf, unread. How sad. Through Scripture, personal reflection, insight and social commentary Tull moves her readers to action. It is a perfect answer to those who think that maybe the church should stay out of the politics of climate change and stewardship of creation. The author shows us that scripture tells a different story than the mere human story that is often one of self-centeredness. It is a story where we see that the story of God's relationship with God's people is one that invites respect and gratitude as we learn our dependence and

connectedness to the larger cosmos.
