PROCEDURAL MATTERS

- A. Principles of Parliamentary Law
 - Courtesy to all
 - Majority rule
 - Justice for all

- One Item at a time
- Respect the rights of the minority
- Partiality for none
- Usually pro and con speakers will alternate and individual speaking will identify his or her position.
- No one is allowed to speak more than once on a pending question until all wishing to speak have been heard; a person can then speak a second time, but no more than twice (unless the body gives special permission by two-thirds vote for a third speech).
- B. Relevant Provisions of Presbytery's Manual (Section III of Manual)
 - 1. "No new business shall be introduced after Presbytery recesses for lunch (unless by two-thirds vote Presbytery sets a different deadline for introduction of new business), and any new business not listed on the docket shall be presented in written form."
 - 2. "...each elder elected an officer, General Presbyter, or a member of Leadership Team shall be enrolled as a member of the Presbytery for the term of office, whether or not commissioned by his or her session."
 - 3. "The privilege of the floor without vote shall be granted to lay members of Presbytery's committees and to laypersons serving on Presbytery's staff, if not enrolled as members of the Presbytery."
 - 4. "The privilege of the floor without vote shall be granted to certified church educators serving the churches of Presbytery, if not enrolled as members of the Presbytery. Certified church educators who are ruling elders and serving churches of Presbytery shall have voice and vote privileges. (G-2.1103b)"

<u>NOTE</u>: The phrase, "privilege of the floor without vote," means that the person has the privilege of speaking on the floor of Presbytery, including debating a motion under consideration, subject to rules and guidelines that govern discussion and debate. However, the person does not have the privilege to make motions or to vote.

Those who have "privilege of the floor without vote" are lay members of committees, lay members of Presbytery staff, church educators, and youth advisory delegates. Those with "voice and vote" privileges are member Teaching Elders, Ruling Elder commissioners, Certified Christian Educators*, Commissioned Ruling Elders, General Presbyter, Stated Clerk, Recording Clerk, Treasurer, Moderator, Members of Leadership Team and Presbytery Committee chairs.

- C. Procedural Rules for the meeting of Presbytery (approval by two-thirds vote required to adopt #3).
 - 1. Persons wishing to speak to the Presbytery giving a report, debating a motion, raising questions will do so by using the microphones.
 - 2. Each speaker, after recognition by the Moderator, will give his or her name and church name (or other relationship to the Presbytery if not pastor or elder commissioner from a session).
 - 3. Limitation of Debate 30 minutes per main motion, with each individual limited to 3 minutes per speech.
 - 4. A recommendation from a committee or other entity elected by the Presbytery, upon being presented to Presbytery by an elected member of that entity, is considered to be on the floor for Presbytery's debate, amendment, and disposition without the necessity of a motion placing the recommendation on the floor.

Motion Basics

STEPS OF THE MOTION

- 1. Commissioner rises and addresses the Moderator.
- 2 Moderator recognizes commissioner and grants the floor.
- 3 Commissioner makes motion. (Commissioner may not debate before the motion is seconded.)
- 4. Another commissioner seconds the motion without recognition from the moderator.
- 5. *Moderator* states the motion.
- 6 *Moderator* calls for debate. (Maker of the motion has the privilege of first debate.) All speakers must address the moderator and be recognized by the moderator.
- 7. *Moderator* states the motion.
- 8 *Moderator* takes the vote and announces the vote and the results of the vote.
- 9. Moderator states the next order of business.

SEVEN USEFUL MOTIONS

1. Amend. There are *only* three forms of simple amendment.

- **a.** to delete or strike out
- **b.** to add or insert
- c. to strike out and insert

The words proposed for deletion or addition *must be consecutive words*. When the amendment does not involve consecutive words or is longer than a paragraph, the motions "to substitute" (a form of amendment) is used. This is a difficult motion and should *never* be used when the simple form of amendment can be used.

2 Commit or Refer. To commit or refer back to committee for further study and amendment allows the consultative process to be used in greater depth. When this motion is made, it needs to state clearly what committee; appointment of the committee, if necessary; the task of the committee; and report time.

3. Postpone to a Particular Time. This motion takes precedence over the preceding two and has the power to grant additional time to a particular member or committee or do further study or consultation. It should always be used in preference to "table" because it permits debate on the propriety of postponement.

4. Limits on Debate. The assembly always has the power, and the moderator the right of suggestion, to limit debate to a particular hour, or extend or shorten speeches according to the necessity of the moment. Limits on the length of speeches are advisable in instances where the issue before the assembly is highly divisive and many members wish to speak.

5. Previous Question. The maker of the motion "to move the previous question" (close debate and immediately take the vote) must be recognized by the moderator and the motion must receive a second. *It is never in order when called from thefloor*. This motion should never be considered when it is used to prevent legitimate debate.

6. Lay on the Table. This motion is seldom necessary. The motion "to postpone" is always preferable because of its lower rank and its debatability. Misuse of this subsidiary motion can be a strategy that seriously abridges the rights of the assembly because of its high rank and its adoption by a majority vote without debate. The moderator is obliged to explain carefully to the assembly the implications of this motion should it be made.

7. Consideration by Paragraph or Seriatim. Consideration by paragraph or seriatim is an incidental motion that may be suggested by the moderator or any two members of the assembly, allowing for orderly consideration of a complex proposal with several different parts, clarifying for the assembly the controversial aspects of the proposal. Each paragraph of the proposal can be amended without finally adopting the new wording until the final action on the main motion as amended.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE GENERAL PRESBYTER

February 15, 2020

Below you'll find what I've been up to since my last presbytery report. This one covers November 2019 – January 2020.

As I look back over 2019, I am impressed by the number of churches that have found pastors. Beckley Presbyterian Church called Monte Mitchell. Bream Memorial Presbyterian Church called Dawn Adamy. Bluefield First Presbyterian Church called Maggie Rust. Nancy Kahaian and Glen Coleman started as the interim pastors at Charleston First Presbyterian Church. Jim Johnson started as the Commissioned Pastor at Second Presbyterian Church, Huntington.

On January 1 of this year, Nancy Didway officially started her ministry at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church in Pinch even as she continues to serve as the pastor at Highlawn Presbyterian Church in St. Albans. In January alone, the Committee on Ministry approved the call for a pastor of Nitro First Presbyterian Church (pending the congregational vote) and Dale Carey to serve as the pastor of Williamson First Presbyterian Church (pending his successful examination on the floor of presbytery at this meeting, as he's seeking to become Presbyterian after having been ordained as a Baptist.) John Yeager was also approved as the Commissioned Pastor of Enslow Park Presbyterian Church, Huntington, and James Riggs was approved as the Stated Supply Pastor of Davis Memorial Presbyterian Church, Gassaway.

That's 10 churches and 11 pastors in a 12-month period. We're making progress. That's good to remember because we can get discouraged – to be honest, I get discouraged – at the number of churches closing and the number of pastors retiring. That's still happening, but that's not the whole story.

At the Synod Executive Forum in January, one of my colleagues said that her presbytery had started to have "pre-legacy conversations" with their congregations. They aren't suggesting that a church will close or even needs to close, but they are challenging their congregations to think about the future by asking, "What kind of legacy do you want to leave behind?"

I'm not sure we need to do that, but even if churches aren't yet ready to consider the possibility of closing, they still need to consider the question, "When will you be ready to talk about closing?" What's going to be the tipping point? When the pastor or the organist leaves? When the matriarch or patriarch passes away? When the roof or the furnace or the air conditioner needs replaced? When you get down to 10 members on the roll or average less than six people in worship? When you have run through all but ______ of your reserves? You can fill in the blank with \$10,000 or \$5,000 or whatever amount you chose. You could even choose \$0, which means that you'll keep going until the money runs out. (While that's a plan, it's not necessarily a good one.) We make better, more considered decisions when we can consider different options and different points of view and when we address the elephant in the room instead of pretending that everything is all right.

It's not necessarily a matter of size that determines if or when these conversations need to take place. There are 10- and 20-member congregations that are doing great ministry, have been the same size for decades, and show no signs of slowing down. There are much larger congregations that are barely hanging on as they wistfully remember their glory days. So maybe it's a matter of energy level or perhaps perspective that would make such a conversation helpful.

I think it's better to have such a conversation before it's forced upon you and before the church becomes a burden instead of a joy.

Let us know how we can be helpful to you as you consider the future of your congregation.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE VOCATIONS COMMITTEE

Kevin Geurink, Committee Chair February 15, 2020

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Vocations Committee has met since November 2018 with Garland Dale Carey, an ordained minister in the Southern Baptist Church, with regard to his desire to be transferred as a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and in the Presbytery of West Virginia. Rev. Dr. Carey has been serving as the Stated Supply for the First Presbyterian Church, Williamson, West Virginia, as he completes the necessary requirements for transfer. In connection with G-2.0505 and G-2.0607, the committee recommends:

- 1. That the certification of Garland Dale Carey's ordination by First Baptist Church, Rose Hill, Virginia, of the Southern Baptist Church, be accepted as fulfillment of the constitutional requirement that he shall furnish credentials and evidence of good standing acceptable to the presbytery (G-2.0505). The Presbytery received a letter of good standing from the West Virginia Conference of Southern Baptists.
- 2. That Garland Dale Carey's Bachelor of Arts degree from Clear Creek Baptist Bible College, his Master of Theology degree from Campbellsville University, and his Doctor of Education degree from the University of the Cumberlands, be considered satisfactory fulfillment of the provisions of G-2.0505a and G-2.0607b-c, which require that he submit satisfactory evidence of scholarship required of candidates, waiving the requirement in G-2.0607c requiring a transcript from a theological institution accredited by the Association of Theological Schools.

Rationale: The Campbellsville University is accredited by the Southern Association of Schools Commission on Colleges, which is one of the six regional accreditation agencies that cover the United States and is recognized by U.S. Department of Education and by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation. The main difference is that these six regional accrediting agencies are institutional accreditors, not degree program accreditors, and focus on the stability and integrity of the institution as a whole.

 That Garland Dale Carey's examination by the Vocations Committee and his successful completion of ordination examinations – Bible Content, Bible Exegesis, Church Polity, Theology, Worship and Sacraments – be considered satisfactory fulfillment of the provisions of G-2.0505a and G-2.0607a-d.

- 4. Pending approval at this meeting of Garland Dale Carey's call as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Williamson, West Virginia, be affirmed as evidence of call of work properly under the jurisdiction of the presbytery (G-2.0505a).
- 5. That the Presbytery examine Garland Dale Carey for membership in the Presbytery of West Virginia of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) (G-2.0505a). His biographical statement and Statement of Faith follow this report.
- 6. That under the provisions G-2.0505b, upon the acceptance of the ordination vows and with satisfactory evidence of having been removed from the roll of ministers of the Southern Baptist Church, that Garland Dale Carey be enrolled as a minister of the Presbytery of West Virginia.

PERSONAL BACKGROUND AND MINISTRY SYNOPSIS

My name is Garland Dale Carey. I go by Dale. I was born on March 1, 1975 in the small Southern West Virginia coalmining town of Williamson. I am the son of Beatrice Jarrell Chafin of Delbarton, WV and the late Garland Carey, Jr. of Chattaroy, WV. I have three elder sisters: Debra Catron of Delbarton, WV; Brenda Messer of Kermit, WV; and Tamara Carey of Columbus, OH. I am a 1993 graduate of Mingo Christian School of Lenore, WV. At the conclusion of my senior year, I accepted a full-time position with my father's company, Carey Manufactured Home Sales, Inc. of Naugatuck, WV, where I served as vice president and sales manager for nine and a half years.

I married Melissa Dawn Earnest of Borderland, WV on July 7, 1995. We were high school sweethearts. Melissa is employed by First Baptist Church of Williamson, WV, where she serves as secretary and treasurer, and is also the treasurer of the Greater Williamson Ministerial Association (GWMA). Although Melissa and I have been married for over 24 years, we have not been blessed with children. We do, however, love children, but have accepted the fact that it was not God's will for us to have any of our own.

I surrendered my life to Jesus Christ on November 10, 1985. God called me to preach on July 16, 1997. I was first ordained a United Baptist minister and pastored America United Baptist Church in Delbarton, WV for a little over four years. I quickly learned, however, that my beliefs did not align with the United Baptist denomination as I wholeheartedly embraced the assurance of salvation. I gave up my credentials and moved to Pineville, KY to attend a Southern Baptist Bible college in 2002. I was ordained as a Southern Baptist minister in 2004 and have served as pastor of four Southern Baptist churches: First Baptist Church, Rose Hill, VA; Turner Ridge Baptist Church, Falmouth, KY; Enterprise Baptist Church, Lowland, TN; and Chattaroy Missionary Baptist Church, Chattaroy, WV. Nevertheless, I continued to struggle theologically as a Baptist minister and pastor. I differed with Baptists over females in ministry, the acceptable mode of baptism, infant baptism, church government, divorce, and election. I knew I did not fit, and my congregations knew I did not fit, but I just did not know where I fit until God placed a couple Presbyterian ministers in my path during my pastorate in TN. We became great friends, and through these friendships, I ascertained that I could be more effective as a Presbyterian minister than a Baptist minister. I was, therefore, elected as the supply pastor by First Presbyterian Church of Williamson, WV in October 2018. I instantly discovered that my assumption was correct; I align much better with Presbyterian doctrine and polity than with Baptist.

In addition to my pastorates, I currently serve as president of the Greater Williamson Ministerial Association (GWMA), which is a position I have held since 2016. GWMA is a non-profit religious organization that exists to promote dialogue and fellowship between local clergy and partnership among the various denominations and churches extant in our region.

As it pertains to higher education, I earned a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Clear Creek Baptist Bible College in 2006, a Master of Theology (M.Th.) from Campbellsville University in 2009, and a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) from the University of the Cumberlands in 2013. I was inducted into the Kappa Delta Pi International Honor Society in Education in 2012 for outstanding academic achievements in higher learning.

PERSONAL STATEMENT OF FAITH Dr. Garland Dale Carey, Ed.D.

I believe there is one and only one, eternally existent, true, and living God who is the creator, redeemer, preserver, and ruler of the entire universe, and is revealed in a triune manner as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit with distinct attributes but without division of nature or essence.

I believe God is the sovereign ruler over the universe, creatures, and the course of human history. God is eternally omnipotent, omniscient, and omnipresent. God is often designated Father to speak of God's creatorship of all things visible and invisible. To those who are called to faith in Jesus Christ, God is the Eternal Father.

I believe Jesus Christ is fully God but also became fully human. Jesus was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born into this world by the Virgin Mary. Jesus Christ's sacrificial death on the cross redeemed fallen humanity from sin. Jesus was buried, raised from the dead, and ascended into heaven where he is exalted as the mediator between God and humanity. Jesus Christ will return to this earth culminate his redemptive work and to also judge the world in righteousness.

I believe the Holy Spirit inspired devout humans to write the Scriptures, convicts individuals of sin, draws people to Christ the Savior, and justifies those called to faith in Christ. The Holy Spirit is also the counselor and teacher of believers in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, secures their redemption by personally dwelling in them, and empowers them to be effective witnesses for Christ.

I believe the Scriptures were written by humans by the inspiration of God. All 66 books of the Old and New Testaments are the revelation of God and a testimony to saving faith and godly living. Though the Old Testament was originally written in Hebrew and the New Testament in Greek, it is God's desire that the Bible be translated into all languages of the world.

I believe the Church is a single, undivided group of believers who have received salvation through Jesus Christ. While the Universal Church consists of all the redeemed from every culture and nation, whether in heaven or in earth, God has established *local* congregations to proclaim the gospel of Christ to the world. I also believe that both men and women are empowered for service in the local church.

I believe baptism is a "sign and seal" of the believer's union with Christ. Children are also qualified for baptism as baptism places a child under the care and witness of the Church family. Baptism is to be performed in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

I believe the Lord's Supper is a celebration of the believer's union with Christ and his or her reconciliation to God. The Lord's Supper consists of the partaking of bread, signifying the sacrifice of Christ's body for sins, and of the fruit of the vine, symbolizing Christ's shed blood for forgiveness of sins. Christ is spiritually present during the Lord's Supper.

Stephen Cort's Statement of Faith

01 By God's grace, I believe in one God, revealed in the distinct persons of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, sharing one eternal substance/being; unified perfectly in holy and loving communion.

O2 God graciously reveals himself to all in his creation and specifically in the authoritative, sufficient, and approachable canon of the Old and New Testament Scriptures, comprised of 66 books.

1 believe all persons are God's image bearers, created for communion with the Lord and with one another, uniquely gifted to be stewards of creation.

05 However, what was created all good is good no more; sin has tainted everyone and all things. Humanity is broken, the creation "groans," and we are lost.

06 Sin is a life orientation away from God, resulting in "disordered loves" and death in various forms.

07 Without God's intervention we would not desire righteousness, be capable of true transformation, and would face destruction in this life and beyond.

08 By the sovereign mercy of God the Father, through the atoning work of the Son, and by the gracious power of the Holy Spirit, a new orientation and abundant life are available.

09 I believe God, in holy love, redeems by grace through faith.

10 Shadowed and anticipated in the pages of the Old Testament, God, the Son, came in human flesh to rescue, reconcile, and redeem all who through the Spirit believe.

11 Jesus Christ is our substitutionary atonement, the "Lamb of God," perfect in love of the Father, perfect in love as Shepherd of his sheep, and perfect in faithful obedience.

12 Fully God and fully human, the Son is our Priest, able to sympathize with us in our weaknesses; he is our good Shepherd, guiding us and bearing our burdens; and he is the King of Kings, revealing in his life, death, and resurrection God's good and gracious rule.

13 He was bodily raised from the dead on the third day and after revealing himself to his disciples he ascended into heaven from where he intercedes for us.

14 He is the King of a new kingdom, the Church, whose citizenry is characterized by the humility and trust of a child, united in the confession, "Jesus is Lord," and serve as ambassadors of reconciliation and peace.

15 Jesus Christ will return unexpectedly to utterly defeat sin and to consummate a new heaven and new earth in which mercy, righteousness, and justice will dwell forever.

16 I believe the sovereign Holy Spirit convicts of sin and of righteousness, dwells within us, brings us into God's family through faith in Christ, inspires and illuminates the Scriptures, conforms us to the Son's image, empowers and gifts the Church for ministry, teaches us to pray, instructs us in love, leads us in truth, establishes unity, purifies our worship, and preserves us until the day of full redemption.

17 Instituted by Christ and made efficacious by the Holy Spirit, I believe baptism and the Lord's Supper are the bloodless signs of the New Covenant.

18 Baptism is washing, birthing, dying, pledging, confessing, remembering, receiving, supporting, and confirming God's grace and adoption to those professing faith in Christ and for covenant children.

19 The Lord's Supper is the means by which the Holy Spirit raises us into the presence of the glorified Christ: a foretaste of the diverse, heavenly banquet for all who believe, spiritual nourishment for our earthly exodus, a reminder of Christ's atoning death, resurrection, and of his return, and a declaration of our unity in the One who washed his disciple's feet.

20 These are corporate signs, distinctive marks of a people called out of darkness and into God's marvelous Light by grace, and signs of God's faithfulness in salvation, sanctification, and reconciliation until he comes again.

I believe the Church is God's people called out of the bondage of sin, set free for worship, engaged in a life together of grateful obedience and service, and sent forth to declare the excellences of the Beloved, and blessed to be a blessing to our neighborhood and to the nations.

22 The temporal Church is comprised of belief and unbelief (wheat and tares); jars of clay filled with the treasure of God's Good News of salvation.

23 The eternal Church is the Bride of Christ comprised of all the faithful throughout the ages who enjoy eternal communion with God.

24 The Church's hope is God's merciful call and faithfulness, manifested in Jesus.

25 The Church's mission is to glorify God in holy love and to be faithful lights in darkness.

When the King of Glory returns, sin will be judged and removed and a great congregation, made up of many cultures and more numerous than the stars of the sky and sands of the sea, will join with the angels in worship, singing, "Holy, Holy, Holy is the Lord God, the Almighty."

27 By God's grace, this is what I believe, and in God's grace I find hope and peace as the journey of learning, serving, and believing continues.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION TO DISSOLVE THE BEVERLY HILLS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

David Richards, Chair of the Commission February 15, 2020

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That the Beverly Hills Presbyterian Church be dissolved effective January 26, 2020

2. That the Administrative Commission be dismissed with thanks

RATIONALE AND BACKGROUND:

At the August 24, 2019 meeting of the Presbytery, the Moderator was authorized to appoint an Administrative Commission to dissolve the Beverly Hills Presbyterian Church, Huntington, at their request.

Members of the Administrative Commission:

- David Richards (Minister, Honorably Retired)
- Chris Bailey (Minister, Marshall UKIRK)
- Pat Collier (Ruling Elder, Bates Memorial)
- Pat Gebhart (Ruling Elder, First Huntington)
- Terri Effingham (Ruling Elder, Beverly Hills)
- Trish Rorrer (Ruling Elder, Beverly Hills)

The AC met for its first time on September 12, 2019. As the decision had already been made by the session to seek closing as early as February of that year, the commission moved ahead accordingly. Assignments were made, and meetings began in earnest. As there was a pastor still in place, Cinda Harkless, some of the work was left for her and the session. The commission worked closely with Terri Effingham, who served as a liaison to the session. The session was takes with the following items:

- to close the Child Care Center (CCC), which was actively serving the community and was under the auspices of the church
- to send a pastoral letter to members of the church regarding the closure
- to collect all records of the session
- to make decisions to allocate some of its remaining funds

During the course of the work of the commission, the Child Care Center was able to move to another facility and continue operations. The pastor and a couple of members were able to get the building cleaned out, all groups using the building moved, the closing worship service was planned, and the property was given into the care of the Presbytery's Trustees.

The closing worship service was held on January 26, 2020 and was attended by a full house of guests, members, and friends. Rev. David Richards, Chair of the Administrative Commission, presented the Statement of Purpose; the pastor, Rev. Cinda Harkless, led an opening prayer, and pastors nurtured by the church gave personal reflections: the Rev. Dr. James McTyre, Lake Hills Presbyterian Church, Knoxville, TN; Rev. Robert Warren, First Presbyterian Church, Mt. Sterling, KY. Rev. Robin Blakeman, Parish Associate at Beverly Hills Presbyterian Church, spoke to the children. From the Presbytery, Maureen Wright, Stated Clerk, and the Rev. Dr. Edward Thompson, General Presbyter, also participated in the service.

Following the service, a catered lunch was provided, and guests were encouraged to browse old photo albums and church records.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE MISSION COMMITTEE

RECOMMENDATION:

- The Nyeri Visitors subcommittee, moderated by Rick Accord, is at work preparing to host visitors from Nyeri Presbytery in August 2020. It is not yet know how many visitors will visit West Virginia. Robert McCutcheon will be working on those details during his current excursion to Nyeri. The committee is looking for congregations who would be interested in having a part in this planned visit, and who could host the group or part of the group during their time with the Presbytery.

- 1. The annual performance review of the General Presbyter was conducted by two members of the Administration Committee and two members of the Leadership Team in accordance with the manual. With input from the General Presbyter, the goals for 2019 were reviewed and acknowledged as having been successfully achieved. Goals for 2020 were established as a continuation of those from 2019. The report also acknowledged that the General Presbyter was performing a myriad of other functions. The Administration Committee accepted the report and added its thanks to the General Presbyter for his devoted work to the Presbytery.
- 2. The committee established Budget Preparation Guidelines, in order to make future budgeting consistent and reporting to Presbytery complete.
- 3. Approved the Housing Allowance for the Associate for Educational Ministry.
- 4. Heard reports from the Treasurer and General Presbyter.
- 5. Had lunch and enjoyed casual conversation with the staff.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE BLUESTONE COMMITTEE

Denny Dodson, Committee Chair February 15, 2020

RECOMMENDATION:

(CA) Approval of the celebration of the Lord's Supper at the Guy's Weekend, April 24-26, 2020, Spring Getaway Retreat, May 1-3, 2020, and Fall Getaway Retreat, October 2-4, 2020, at Bluestone Camp & Retreat, with a Minister of Word and Sacrament member of Presbytery as officiant.

- 1. The committee asks for general support of the Bluestone programs from all the churches and members of Presbytery. We encourage all churches to allow the Spirit to move them to consider holding church retreats at Bluestone, as well as participating in the special retreats available throughout the year.
- 2. The committee lost two members due to attrition, and even with the Presbytery Manual's reduction of the number of committee members, we sometimes are struggling to keep a quorum for our meetings. We continue to work on motivating maximum participation from committee members, who have secular and church employment, which often overlaps with the committee's work.
- 3. The committee approved the 2020 budget for Bluestone as well as our annual request of the Friends of Bluestone for budgetary support. The committee as always wishes to thank all of Presbytery and leadership for its moral and financial support for the work of the Bluestone summer camps, retreats, and conferences.
- 4. The committee designated February 8 for a day-long workshop to solidify our role as a committee who were are, what we do, what we need to do, and how we reach our full potential as servants of God as we oversee and direct the work of Bluestone.
- 5. The committee is presently putting forth our efforts to maximize participation in the Guys Weekend, the Spring Getaway Retreat, the summer camping experience and the Fall Getaway Retreat, along with the other special weekends and weeklong functions happening at Bluestone in the spring, summer, and fall.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE LEADERDHIP TEAM

Steve Hornbeck, Leadership Team Chair February 15, 2020

- 1. The Leadership Team Retreat was held on January 13-14, 2020. The team spent time in worship led by Tina Vial and team building led by Robin Ray. Our thanks to both for meaningful and interesting programs.
- 2. Amy Wallace Parker was designated as the Overture Advocate for the Presbytery's overture concerning the laying on of hands during ordinations and installations. The overture will be considered by the 2020 General Assembly.
- 3. A group has been assigned to plan locations, themes, and dates of Presbytery meetings for 2021. Congregations interested in hosting a presbytery meeting should contact the Stated Clerk or Leadership Team Chair Steve Hornbeck. Suggestions for themes/speakers for the educational portion of the meeting are also welcome.
- 4. A group was designated to recommend procedures for the New Life Congregational Grants including a name for the group who reviews and recommends awards. The grants are funded through the use of 80 percent of the funds gained from the closure and sale of churches. Tina Vial will serve as the convener of this group.
- 5. A group of former Presbytery Moderators was designated to review the three-year model for Moderator-Elect, Moderator, and Leadership Team Chair. Several former moderators have recommended a review of this process because of the varying skills required of the leaders and the brief time available to complete planned initiatives. Amy Wallace Parker will convene this group.
- 6. Approved a request by the Presbyterian Women to celebrate the Lord's Supper at their gathering on March 28, 2020.
- 7. Tentative meeting dates for the Leadership Team for 2020 were established for May 5, 2020; July 30, 2020, and November 3, 2020.
- 8. The team looked at evolving trends in membership and at budget realities that result from these trends. Stewardship will provide the team with the probable implications of reducing the draw on restricted funds for the near future.
- 9. Church security was discussed, and the Stated Clerk will contact insurers and legal representatives concerning security recommendations for the Presbytery and its churches.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSIONS

February 15, 2020

DISSOLUTION OF LAKEVIEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The commission continues to await information from the heirs who will accept the property back as per the original deed. Once the details of this conversation are clarified, the commission will work with the church to disburse its remaining assets.

DISSOLUTION OF PICKENS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Rich Cardot, pastor of the Valley Parish, now chairs the commission. The commission met with Pickens Ruling Elder Charles Delaney at the Pickens Volunteer Fire Department on November 15, 2019. The group discussed the health and pastoral care of the remaining members of the church, the transfer of the records of the church, the finances of the church, the disposition of the real property, and possibilities to celebrate the life and ministry of the congregation. The Stated Clerk received a letter stating that the financial accounts of the church have been closed. The commission is working with the Trustees to sell or transfer the real property to a member of the church community. The commission plans a closing celebration to include the churches of the Valley Parish and Zion Presbyterian Church, Helvetia in the spring.

DISSOLUTION OF WESTMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, CHARLESTON

The commission is working with the session to conclude the business of the church. A sale of the church building and its surrounding property by the church is pending. The session record and other historical records have been delivered to the Stated Clerk. The remaining real property is being transferred to the Presbytery. The commission is in communication with the members of the church regarding pastoral care and their ongoing discipleship and future church membership.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

James Robinson, Trustees Chair February 15, 2020

- Met via conference call on January 17, 2020, and concurred with the recommendation from Westminster Presbyterian Church, Charleston, to sell the church property for \$135,000 cash. In accordance with lines 166-170 of the Manual of the Presbytery of West Virginia, met via conference call on January 20, 2020 with General Presbyter Ed Thompson, out-going Moderator Steve Hornbeck, and Stated Clerk Maureen Wright to approve the sale.
- 2. Expect to complete action soon on the transfer of the dissolved Richwood Presbyterian Church building and the sale of the Hurricane property.
- 3. The remaining lots of the soon to be dissolved Westminster Presbyterian Church, Charleston, property, and the Beverly Hills Presbyterian Church property are being transferred to the Presbytery in accordance with the Book of Order.
- 4. The sale of the dissolved Brush Creek Presbyterian Church, Ridgeview, property has been completed.
