INFORMATION:

- 1. The 225th General Assembly through the work of the Theology, Worship, and Education Committee considered Overture TWE 06, On Amending W-4.0403 Regarding the Laying on of Hands at an Installation, submitted by the Presbytery of West Virginia. The Rev. Dr. Amy Wallace Parker served as Overture Advocate and addressed the committee on the Presbytery's behalf. Unfortunately, the committee did not approve the overture as submitted for recommendation to the Assembly, but did amend W-4.0403 to include the words, "Signs and symbols of blessing may be conferred on the newly installed or commissioned person." The amended recommendation was approved by the General Assembly. The Presbytery wishes to thank the Rev. Dr. Parker for her work and agency on behalf of Presbytery.
- 2. Statement on the balance or numerical parity of ministers of the Word and Sacrament and Ruling Elders in the presbytery. The Book of Order in G-3.0301 requires that a presbytery address any imbalance that may exist between the number of voting ministers of the Word and Sacrament and the number of voting Ruling Elders. No significant imbalance exists in the Presbytery of West Virginia at this time. As of July 27, 2022, there are 118 congregations entitled to send 119 Ruling Elders to meetings of the presbytery. There are 109 minister of the Word and Sacrament members of presbytery.

Recommendation for Special Procedural Matters Regarding Electronic Meetings & Suspension of Any Manual Rules That Interfere with Them

The Stated Clerk recommends:

That the August 18, 2022 stated meeting of the Presbytery of West Virginia (PWV) be conducted by gathering electronically through the online platform of ZOOM with participants ordinarily using devices with both audio and video.

That, for the purpose of meeting electronically by ZOOM, these will be the special procedural matters, and any manual rules that interfere with them be suspended:

- 1. Participants in the PWV ZOOM Stated Meeting will be minister of the Word and Sacrament members (M), Ruling Elder Commissioners (RE), Commissioned Pastors (CP), Ruling Elders serving on the Leadership Team (LT), Presbytery Committee Members (PCM), Corresponding Members (CM), and any visitors present (V).
- 2. Only registered participants will be enrolled and permitted into the ZOOM meeting.
- 3. All registrants are strongly encouraged to participate in one of the live orientation sessions prior to the PWV ZOOM Stated Meeting.
- 4. All participants will be required to pre-register no later than three days before the meeting.
- 5. Participant access to the PWV ZOOM Stated Meeting will begin at 9 AM, thirty minutes prior to the start of the meeting. If a participant has been "in" the meeting and gets disconnected, every effort will be made to readmit them into the meeting.
- 6. The PWV Stated Clerk and Temporary Clerks shall establish the presence of a quorum, upon reviewing the participants' list in ZOOM, then informing the Moderator, who will then make a declaration of a quorum present.
- 7. Participants may seek recognition by the Moderator using the chat feature or by using the electronic raised hand feature. The Stated Clerk and the Temporary Clerks will monitor these features. The Stated Clerk will advise the Moderator of participants seeking recognition.
- 8. New business must be submitted to the Stated Clerk via email prior to the start of the General Presbyter Report.
- 9. While every effort will be made to provide stable access to ZOOM, each participant is responsible for their audio and internet connections; no action shall be invalidated on the grounds that the loss of, or poor quality of, a participant's individual connection prevented participation in the meeting.

PROCEDURAL MATTERS

- A. Principles of Parliamentary Law
 - Courtesy to all
 - Majority rule Respect the rights of the minority
 - Justice for all Partiality for none
 - Usually pro and con speakers will alternate and individual speaking will identify his or her position.
 - No one is allowed to speak more than once on a pending question until all wishing to speak have been heard; a person can then speak a second time, but no more than twice (unless the body gives special permission by two-thirds vote for a third speech).

- One Item at a time

- B. Relevant Provisions of Presbytery's Manual (Section III of Manual)
 - 1. "No new business shall be introduced after Presbytery recesses for lunch (unless by two-thirds vote Presbytery sets a different deadline for introduction of new business), and any new business not listed on the docket shall be presented in written form."
 - 2. "...each elder elected an officer, General Presbyter, or a member of Leadership Team shall be enrolled as a member of the Presbytery for the term of office, whether or not commissioned by his or her session."
 - 3. "The privilege of the floor without vote shall be granted to lay members of Presbytery's committees and to laypersons serving on Presbytery's staff, if not enrolled as members of the Presbytery."
 - 4. "The privilege of the floor without vote shall be granted to certified church educators serving the churches of Presbytery, if not enrolled as members of the Presbytery. Certified church educators who are ruling elders and serving churches of Presbytery shall have voice and vote privileges. (G-2.1103b)"

<u>NOTE</u>: The phrase, "privilege of the floor without vote," means that the person has the privilege of speaking on the floor of Presbytery, including debating a motion under consideration, subject to rules and guidelines that govern discussion and debate. However, the person does not have the privilege to make motions or to vote.

Those who have "privilege of the floor without vote" are lay members of committees, lay members of Presbytery staff, church educators, and youth advisory delegates. Those with "voice and vote" privileges are member Teaching Elders, Ruling Elder commissioners, Certified Christian Educators*, Commissioned Ruling Elders, General Presbyter, Stated Clerk, Recording Clerk, Treasurer, Moderator, Members of Leadership Team and Presbytery Committee chairs.

- C. Procedural Rules for the meeting of Presbytery (approval by two-thirds vote required to adopt #3).
 - 1. Persons wishing to speak to the Presbytery giving a report, debating a motion, raising questions will do so by using the microphones.
 - 2. Each speaker, after recognition by the Moderator, will give his or her name and church name (or other relationship to the Presbytery if not pastor or elder commissioner from a session).
 - 3. Limitation of Debate 30 minutes per main motion, with each individual limited to 3 minutes per speech.
 - 4. A recommendation from a committee or other entity elected by the Presbytery, upon being presented to Presbytery by an elected member of that entity, is considered to be on the floor for Presbytery's debate, amendment, and disposition without the necessity of a motion placing the recommendation on the floor.

Motion Basics

STEPS OF THE MOTION

- 1. Commissioner rises and addresses the Moderator.
- 2 *Moderator* recognizes commissioner and grants the floor.
- 3 *Commissioner* makes motion. (Commissioner may not debate before the motion is seconded.)
- 4. Another commissioner seconds the motion without recognition from the moderator.
- 5. *Moderator* states the motion.
- 6 *Moderator* calls for debate. (Maker of the motion has the privilege of first debate.) All speakers must address the moderator and be recognized by the moderator.
- 7. Moderator states the motion.
- 8 *Moderator* takes the vote and announces the vote and the results of the vote.
- **9.** *Moderator* states the next order of business.

SEVEN USEFUL MOTIONS

- **1. Amend.** There are *only* three forms of simple amendment.
 - a. to delete or strike out
 - **b.** to add or insert
 - c. to strike out and insert

The words proposed for deletion or addition *must be consecutive words*. When the amendment does not involve consecutive words or is longer than a paragraph, the motions "to substitute" (a form of amendment) is used. This is a difficult motion and should *never* be used when the simple form of amendment can be used.

- 2 Commit or Refer. To commit or refer back to committee for further study and amendment allows the consultative process to be used in greater depth. When this motion is made, it needs to state clearly what committee; appointment of the committee, if necessary; the task of the committee; and report time.
- **3.** Postpone to a Particular Time. This motion takes precedence over the preceding two and has the power to grant additional time to a particular member or committee or do further study or consultation. It should always be used in preference to "table" because it permits debate on the propriety of postponement.
- **4.** Limits on Debate. The assembly always has the power, and the moderator the right of suggestion, to limit debate to a particular hour, or extend or shorten speeches according to the necessity of the moment. Limits on the length of speeches are advisable in instances where the issue before the assembly is highly divisive and many members wish to speak.
- **5.** Previous Question. The maker of the motion "to move the previous question" (close debate and immediately take the vote) must be recognized by the moderator and the motion must receive a second. *It is never in order when called from the floor*. This motion should never be considered when it is used to prevent legitimate debate.
- **6.** Lay on the Table. This motion is seldom necessary. The motion "to postpone" is always preferable because of its lower rank and its debatability. Misuse of this subsidiary motion can be a strategy that seriously abridges the rights of the assembly because of its high rank and its adoption by a majority vote without debate. The moderator is obliged to explain carefully to the assembly the implications of this motion should it be made.
- 7. Consideration by Paragraph or Seriatim. Consideration by paragraph or seriatim is an incidental motion that may be suggested by the moderator or any two members of the assembly, allowing for orderly consideration of a complex proposal with several different parts, clarifying for the assembly the controversial aspects of the proposal. Each paragraph of the proposal can be amended without finally adopting the new wording until the final action on the main motion as amended.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE GENERAL PRESBYTER

August 18, 2022

Two things have taken up large chunks of time this past quarter (May-July). One was the 225th General Assembly. Even though the meetings were livestreamed, which meant that I did not have to travel – and did not need to travel – to Louisville, I still spent a lot of time staring at the computer screen trying to take it all in so that I could report back to the presbytery what was happening. I thank all those who took the time to read my daily reports of those plenary sessions. I have to confess that I did not watch any of the committees in action. If GA had been in person and I had been there on the scene, I would have wandered in and out of committee meetings, trying to be there when the more contentious issues were being discussed. I apologize for slacking off on those online committee sessions, but I just couldn't make myself tune in. One result of this year's GA meeting is that we will have a number of amendments to the constitution to consider. Usually, we have done that at our February presbytery meeting, but since that's scheduled to be held online, we're thinking of moving the voting to the November presbytery meeting instead. We're still figuring out how that might work.

All that has gone into selling the presbytery office building has also taken up large chunks of time, as well as a great deal of psychic energy. Things have gone much faster than I would have anticipated. As I have told many people, my fear was that this building would sit empty for 2+ years before it would be sold, but if the way be clear and the sale price is approved at the called August 4 presbytery meeting, it will have been on the market for less than two months. That is a good thing. Yes, we will have to do some scrambling to get everything out of the building and make all the arrangements so that the staff can work from home by the deadline that we will need to vacate the premises, but the buyer has also graciously given us another month beyond their original proposal, which puts us pretty close to our original timeline for making that transition. There is certainly work to be done, but it should all work. (I will also admit that I had jokingly asked Jesus to come by September 1 so I wouldn't have to move my books out of my office, but I'm not holding my breath that that's going to happen and have begun to think about what I'm going to keep and what I will get rid of in one way or another.)

Two other events of significance took place this past quarter. Enslow Park Presbyterian Church and the surrounding neighborhood in Huntington experienced flooding in the first part of May. I was able to worship with them the Sunday after that happened and was glad to be able to represent the presbytery that day. Even after the rain stopped, there was still water coming into the building. Even after the water was gone, there were still concerns about mold. Our connectional system was demonstrated by grants from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and the Synod of the Trinity, which have proved very helpful. The plan, as of that Sunday, was that they would have everything under control and all cleaned up so that they would be ready in plenty of time to host the presbytery meeting on August 18. Not surprisingly, there was more damage and more to be done and everything ended up taking longer than they first anticipated, so we ended up moving the presbytery meeting online rather than asking another church to host this event with only a few weeks' notice.

The other thing I'm referring to was the death of Jay Nunley, the Commissioned Pastor who had served the Gilbert Presbyterian Church and the First Presbyterian Church of Logan. Jay went in the hospital after Easter. Originally, we thought he might be out of the pulpit for a couple weeks. That turned into a couple of months. Then he died. I was able to worship with the Gilbert and Logan churches the Sunday after he passed away and again was glad to be able to represent the presbytery. Charles and Darlene McNeel, Authorized Lay Preachers, did a wonderful job leading worship that Sunday, and then Jim Musgrave, an Authorized Lay Preacher, did an outstanding job leading the memorial service for Jay the following Wednesday.

Below, you will find an accounting of what I have been up to over the past three months. You may notice that I didn't get to preach very often. That will pick up again in the next quarter. While I like to preach, I have to admit that it makes my life easier and gives me more time to do other things when I don't have to prepare a sermon. It also gives me more flexibility to be with churches following unexpected significant events.

While I'm not looking forward to moving things out of my office, I am excited about the possibilities that are going to open up for the presbytery. We have the opportunity to create a new, different, and better future. I believe God is blessing us with great opportunities.

PRESBYTERY OF WEST VIRGINIA REPORT OF THE LEADERDHIP TEAM

Randy Fife, Leadership Team Chair August 18, 2022

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That the guidelines for New Life Congregational Grants be modified to cap grant awards for any congregation at a total of \$30,000 in any five-year period.

Rationale: In November of 2021, Presbytery granted the authority to the Leadership Team to vary the length of time between grant applications of any congregation. Seeking to be consistent with this approval, at its meeting on April 25, the Leadership Team approved a recommendation from the New Life Grant Committee allowing congregations to apply for grants more often than before, such that, assuming a church complied with other guidelines, it could apply for grants every year, rather than every two years. Thereafter, the New Life Grant Committee recommended to the Leadership Team that a cap be implemented, such that one congregation be limited to \$30,000 in total awards over a five-year period. Together, the two changes would allow a congregation to maintain momentum in a ministry to which it is called, while still preserving funds to be available to all churches throughout the Presbytery. The Leadership Team accordingly recommends that the Presbytery approve a modification to the grant guidelines to provide for a cap of \$30,000 for any one church in a five-year period.

- 2. The dates and locations for the Presbytery's 2023 meetings be set as follows:
 - a. Thursday, February 16, virtual meeting
 - b. Saturday, May 20, Bridgeport/Clarksburg/Fairmont area
 - c. Thursday, August 17, Fayetteville Presbyterian Church
 - d. Saturday, November 18, Charleston area
- 3. The Resource Center be moved to Bream Memorial Presbyterian Church (Charleston) and up to \$1,200 be authorized to pay the expenses of the move.

Rationale: At the May 19, 2022 Presbytery meeting, Presbytery approved the move of the Resource Center to one of the churches of the Presbytery to be staffed by volunteers. The motion stated that the Nurture Committee anticipated ongoing costs of approximately \$3,000 a year to provide for acquisitions, supplies, equipment, and subscriptions as well as the cost of the cataloging program. In addition, Presbytery approved spending up to \$1,000 to move the Resource Center. As the Nurture Committee clarified the center's new location at Bream Memorial Presbyterian Church, the committee was able to determine the exact cost of the move to be \$1,200.

INFORMATION:

- 1. The Leadership Team met on June 29, 2022 (called meeting) in order to draft its proposed committee budget, and to receive an update on efforts towards selling the Presbytery office building. The team met on July 13, 2022, for its regularly scheduled pre-Presbytery meeting. The team met again on July 26, 2022 to consider calling a meeting of the Presbytery for the purpose of considering the Trustees' recommendation as to the price for the sale of the Presbytery building.
- 2. The Team reviewed and approved for presentation to the Presbytery the Stewardship Committee's draft budget for 2023.
- 3. The Team heard from the Nurture Committee, Administration Committee, and Trustees as to the ongoing efforts to prepare the Presbytery building for sale. The building was placed on the market with the assistance of Goldman and Associates. The Team noted that, based on consultations with Goldman, a called meeting of the Presbytery may be needed in order to promptly address offers that may be made from potential buyers (consistent with the need for the Presbytery to approve the sale amount). The Team reviewed the proposals to enter into leases for storage space with First Presbyterian, Charleston and for the Resource Center with Bream Memorial Presbyterian, Charleston, noting that the Trustees would be reviewing the leases.
- 4. Reviewed the need to move the location of the August 18, 2022 Presbytery meeting in light of flooding at the Enslow Park Church, determining that, in light of the limited time remaining before that meeting, the meeting would be held virtually.
- 5. Reviewed feedback from the May 19, 2022 meeting of Presbytery.
- 6. Approved the docket for the August 18, 2022 Presbytery meeting.
- 7. Reviewed the report of the New Life Congregational Grant Committee.
- 8. Reviewed the reports on the work of Presbytery's committees.
- 9. Reviewed the report of the subcommittee on determining locations, dates, and educational themes for 2023 Presbytery meetings.
- 10. Heard from General Presbyter Ed Thompson as to the actions of the General Assembly.
- 11. Recognized the need for an in-depth discussion regarding the designation(s) for the proceeds of the sale of the Presbytery office building.
- 12. Began discussions towards strategic planning for the future of the Presbytery.

- 1. Presbytery approve the following amendment to the Presbytery Manual, regarding "The Vocations Committee when acting as a commission has been empowered to", following line: 664, page 16.
 - Grant reauthorization annually to preside at communion for Authorized Lay Preachers who have been previously authorized by Presbytery to do so.
 - Grant reauthorization annually to preside at communion in their churches of membership for Ruling Elders who have been previously authorized by Presbytery to do so as long as the session records of that church have been submitted for review.

INFORMATION:

- 1. In May, the committee held **Payne Warner**'s annual consultation and approved his continuing as an inquirer; the committee met with Payne again in July and approved his move to candidacy.
- 2. The committee held Candidate **Lauren Davis**' final assessment and approved her ready to receive a call. Lauren is eligible for ordination on or after October 19, 2022.

Guidelines for Cluster Fund Grants Presbytery of West Virginia Revised June 23, 2022

Cluster fund grants can be given for fellowship events, missions, or ministries. Grants are usually limited to \$500 per applicant, per year. Grants will be awarded using the following guidelines.

- 1. The ministry or fellowship event must involve at least two or more churches who are members of the Presbytery of West Virginia.
- 2. The grant will normally be used for ministry, education, or fellowship within the Presbytery.
- 3. Applicants may apply as often as every year, but preference will be given to first-time applications.
- 4. The total amount available for grants is \$2,000. This money will be awarded on a first-come, first-serve basis. Repeat applications will be considered after July 1 each year.
- 5. Grant requests must be for a specified amount supported by documentation.




